#### D. SECTORAL DEVELOPMENT PLANS

#### I. SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT PLAN

#### A. Introduction

The Social Development Plan for the City of General Trias will rely on a holistic discussion of all its social component aspects, namely within the contexts of the City's Health and Nutrition, Education, Housing and Shelter, Protective Services, Sports and Recreation, as well as its General Social Welfare Services. Social Development in these aspects shall deal with how much more should be reinforced in these services to support responsible, law-abiding, healthy, and self-sufficient citizenry. Strategizing a plan for the population especially for its most vulnerable sectors will only guarantee the access to everyone.

### B. Key Issues and Concerns

#### **Health and Nutrition**

- The latest malnutrition rate registered in 2018 was at 3.82% for the whole city. Barangays Alingaro, Buenavista I, Dulong Bayan, Governor Ferrer, Pinagtipunan, San Francisco, Santiago, and Vibora (8 barangays of 33) registered prevalence rates above 5 percent;
- The PH national standard for doctor to patient ratio is 1:33,000. General Trias has a total of 471 doctors both in public and private hospitals, marking the ratio at 1:779 using the projected population for 2018, which is significantly better than the global average at 1:6,600;
- The DOH's target for hospital bed to population ratio is 1:800. The City of General Trias has an authorized bed capacity of 320 hospital beds for its public and private hospitals. This marks the hospital bed to population ratio at 1:982, inching closely to DOH's standard;
- The prevalence of Wasted and Severely Wasted for the year 2018 is at 5.7 percent;
- The Maternal Mortality Rate (MMR) as per the EP of General Trias is 87.37% while the Provincial MMR is at 40 percent;
- The Infant Mortality Rate (IMR) as per the EP of General Trias is 2.84% while the Provincial IMR is at 9 percent;
- The fertility rate for Philippines in 2018 was 2.580 births per woman while General Trias is at 1.14 births per woman;
- According to the latest WHO data published in 2018, life expectancy in Philippines is: Male 66.2, Female 72.6, and total life expectancy is 69.3. The total life expectancy at General Trias is at 79 years of age;
- There was a total of 314 cases of teenage pregnancy last 2018 (8.02% of total number of mothers giving birth that year. (Source: Civil Registry); and
- A total of 220 HH remained without access to sanitary toilet facilities. Source: CHO (2020)

### Education

- Lowest literacy rates found in the barangays of Manggahan at 76.92%, followed by Buenavista II at 85.97%, and Pasong Kawayan II at 90.97% while the aim is to be 100% across the whole LGU. (Based on the CCVA Analysis data found in the EP 2018);
- The student to teacher ratio in private elementary (17:1) and secondary (23:1) schools are within the standards of the Department of Education, which is (31:1) for elementary level and (36:1) for secondary level. On the contrary, the ratio for public elementary (37:1) and secondary (34:1) schools are lagging behind the set standard for SY 2018 to 2019; and
- There are no NAT examinations for school year 2018-2019, but the most recent NAT results of children from General Trias show 43.05 for Grade 6 students (Elementary) while 43.33 for Grade 10 students (Junior High School).

#### **Housing and Utilities**

- As of 2015, there are 579 households under the tenure status of house/lot that are renting for free and without the consent of the lot owner and 2,623 squatting in vulnerable areas such as the streets, caves and water bodies:
- Basic services such as water and power are present in all resettlement areas, however, there is still a
  need for the government to provide a garbage disposal/system and community centers to the areas
  for the well-being of their residents;
- The City recorded a total of 1,704 Informal Settler Families (ISF); and
- A total of 220 HH remained without access to sanitary toilet facilities.

#### **Protective Services**

- In 2018, the total number of police personnel sums up to 120 which translates to a police-to-population ratio of 1:3,054. The current police-to-population ratio falls short to the minimum standard ratio of 1:1.000:
- The current ratio of fire personnel-to-population is at 1:16,658 which does not meet the minimum standard of 1:2,000; and
- From 2016-2018, the crime incidences in the City of General Trias posted a total of 2,191 cases wherein 977 or 44.6% are index crimes while 1,214 (55.4%) are non-index crimes. Year 2016 recorded the highest number of crimes which reached a total of 862 cases.

### **Social Welfare Services**

- Various social groups among the youth, elderly, and other vulnerable sectors that comprise society
  have the City Social Welfare and Development (CSWD) Office as the distinct institutional body catering
  to their interests and rights as they continue living in the city.
- The city government in its commitment to reduce poverty and vulnerability to risks has advocated various programs on Social Protection to achieve the goal of eradicating extreme poverty and hunger, enhance the social status and promoting inclusive growth and equitable access to quality basic social services, especially by the poor and vulnerable. These include the Social Assistance program constituting (i) the Pantawid Pamilyang Pilipino Program (4Ps), which provides conditional cash transfers (CCTs) to eligible poor households with children aged 0–18 years and/or with pregnant women; (ii) the KapitBisig Laban sa Kahirapan-Comprehensive Integrated Delivery of Social Services

(KALAHICIDSS) National Community-Driven Development Program, which provides grants to communities to build social infrastructure; (iii) the Sustainable Livelihood Program, which provides livelihood opportunities to poor families and vulnerable or marginalized groups; (iv) unconditional cash transfer programs to mitigate the inflationary effects of the 2018 tax reforms (e.g., rice subsidy of ₱600 [\$12] as additional cash grants for 4Ps households); (v) supplemental feeding programs targeting malnourished school children up to grade 6; (vi) assistance to individuals in crisis situations; and (vii) the social pension program for indigent senior citizens. These programs are implemented by the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD). Notwithstanding its growing impact, its implementation is tainted with issues among program beneficiaries and the displaced applicants.

#### **Social Protection**

- Risks and vulnerability as the main factors behind poverty and deprivation:
- Delayed social assistance benefits;
- Issues on whether pension and social assistance benefits are well targeted on the poor;
- Targeting system is infrequently updated;
- Not all poor received social assistance benefits;
- Beneficiaries face constraints in accessing of transfers;
- Parent-beneficiaries depend on the government financial assistance and do not work anymore;
- 4Ps student-grantees were discriminated
- Cost associated with program administration;
- Financial literacy of the beneficiaries, unqualified beneficiaries who are not supposed to be in the program, and beneficiaries not fully aware of the program; and
- Monitoring and evaluation of the effectiveness of social protection programs.

### **Gender and Development**

- Lack of awareness of women on their rights;
- Inadequate support of local and national government agencies to VAWC cases;
- Less informed communities on the implementation of VAWC laws and their roles to curtail the violence;
- Increasing cases of VAWC;
- Presence of discrimination against LGBTQ++;
- Limited resources and support for solo parents; and
- Insufficient measures for the reintegration and aftercare of Persons Who Uses Drugs (PWUDs).

### **Sports and Recreation**

 Currently there is no profiling and data gathering on an institutional level for this aspect of societal living. However, there are already appropriate venues for breeding home-grown local athletes in the city.
